Please be aware that any grant that brings in less than <u>15% in indirect costs (IDC)</u> will need to be supplemented up to the 15% equivalent by existing investigator or departmental sundry funds. Resolution of this issue must occur prior to submitting a proposal. <u>Training fellowships</u> from foundations, public charity, and non-profit organizations <u>are excluded</u> from this minimum IDC requirement.

1. AACR Gastric Cancer Research Fellowships, American Association for Cancer Research (AACR)

The Debbie's Dream Foundation-AACR Gastric Cancer Research Fellowship represents a joint effort to encourage and support postdoctoral or clinical research fellows to conduct gastric cancer research and to establish a successful career path in this field. The research proposed for funding may be basic, translational, clinical, or epidemiological in nature and must have direct applicability and relevance to gastric cancer.

This fellowship provides funds over one year to support the salary and benefits of a fellow while working on mentored gastric cancer research. A partial amount of the funds may be designated for non-personnel expenses, such as research/laboratory supplies, equipment, publication charges for manuscripts that pertain directly to the funded project, and other research expenses.

4. Making a Difference in Real-World Bioethics Dilemmas, Greenwall Foundation

The Greenwall Foundation is requesting proposals for the Spring 2019 cycle of its bioethics grants program, Making a Difference in Real-World Bioethics Dilemmas, to support research to help resolve an important emerging or unanswered bioethics problem in clinical, biomedical, or public health decision-making, policy, or practice.

The Foundation's vision is to make bioethics integral to decisions in health care, policy, and research. Our mission is to expand bioethics knowledge to improve clinical, biomedical, and public health decision-making, policy, and practice. Projects funded under the Making a

Difference program should promote the Foundation's vision and mission through innovative bioethics research that will have a real-world, practical impact.

While we welcome all innovative proposals that will have a real-world impact, we are particularly interested in proposals that address the ethical and policy issues raised by the following priority topics:

- Developments in artificial intelligence;
- Responses to the opioid epidemic;
- Bias and discrimination in clinical care against patients or clinicians, based on a broad range of characteristics;
- Advances in biomedical and clinical research and their translation into clinical practice;
- Healthcare access, costs, and resource allocation.

5. Basic Research Grants Program and Fellowships, Hereditary Disease Foundation

The Hereditary Disease Foundation is currently accepting Letters of Intent (LOIs) for Grants and Postdoctoral Fellowships. The HDF provides funding for research that advances the discovery and development of treatments and a cure for Huntington's disease and other brain diseases.

The HDF gives highest priority to providing funding to investigators enthusiastic about launching a career in Huntington's disease research. These include postdoctoral fellows, instructors and new assistant professors.

The postdoctoral fellowship applicant's mentor must agree in advance to direct the proposed research. The Foundation cannot arrange laboratories and mentors for applicants.

6. Nontraditional, Nonsurgical Treatment Grants, North American Spine Society (NASS)

The Nontraditional, Nonsurgical Treatment Grant is the result of a donation to research as part of a settlement of a class action lawsuit unrelated to NASS. This grant supports research of discrelated and/or neuropathic back pain by nonsurgical techniques. These funds must be used for new, nontraditional methods of nonsurgical treatment of such back and neck pain and radiculopathy. If TNF-inhibitors other than etanercept are used in research and/or treatment funded, comparison studies using perispinal etanercept in at least as many research subjects or patients should be done.

Applicants do NOT need to be NASS members.

7. Research Grants, North American Spine Society (NASS)

Research grants should focus on basic science, clinical or translational research. Basic research may focus on projects that further our understanding of the mechanisms of disease and developing novel models for prevention and/ or treatment. Clinical research may focus on projects that investigate the epidemiology, prevention, and or treatment of spine disease. Translational research may focus on projects that move findings from the `bench to bedside'.

NASS research grants provide funding for promising research projects by qualified investigators in the field of spine. Funding amount and number of grants are at the discretion of the NASS Research Project Management Committee based upon merit of applications and amount of funding available each year.

Applicants do NOT need to be NASS members.

10. HTRS/Novo Nordisk Clinical Fellowship Award (CFA) in Hemophilia and Rare Bleeding Disorders, Thrombosis & Hemostasis Societies of North America

The goals of this program are to: (1) provide financial support for early career physicians interested in enhancing their training in hematology with a 12-month fellowship focused on hemophilia and RBDs under the guidance of an experienced mentor; and (2) combat the shortage of skilled hematologists in North America by providing funding, mentorship, and career development support to early career physicians pursuing careers in benign hematology.

Applicants are strongly encouraged to present a plan for the fellowship year that goes beyond the clinical care of patients with bleeding disorders to include participation in a scholarly activity (e.g. assisting in a mentor's clinical research, helping to develop a program, or committing to additional education meant to advance a career in hemostasis clinical care or research, such as quality improvement).
